WES Fourth Grade Students

- WES students joined staff and parents to develop ideas about how they can succeed in reading and math. Students thought of the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and school:
 - Use websites my teacher has provided to practice reading, math, and writing at home.
 - Read each night at home.
 - Complete my homework and ask for help from my parents when I don't understand.

Parents, students, and teachers work together for success!

WES Fourth Grade Teachers

- The fourth grade teachers will work with students and their families to support student success in reading and math. Some of our key connections with families will be:
 - Teachers will send home a reading log to encourage independent reading at home.
 - Teachers will provide parents and students with suggested IXL lessons to do at home that preview and review fraction skills.
 - Teachers will communicate with parents through Wednesday folders, Remind, and student agendas about math and reading homework and ways for parents to help at home.

At Home

- WES parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support student success:
 - Attend Family and School Team (FAST) meetings to learn about activities to practice at home that support my child's grade level goals.
 - Practice ELA and reading skills at home by reading daily with my child, working on sight words, or using IXL and other educational websites together at home.
 - Look for and read the class newsletter to stay informed about what my child is learning in class. Use the math and reading tips provided in the newsletter to support learning at home.
